

Prepare your space | Turn off all electronics, light a candle, and sit in a comfortable chair

Prepare your head | "Things are not always what they appear." In our first reading we hear about how David is chosen as the unlikely future king of Israel. In the psalm we are reminded that when it seems God has abandoned us in the "dark valleys" of life, he is still our Good Shepherd walking beside us. St. Paul teaches us, we were once in darkness, but now we walk in the light



of the Lord. Lastly, the Gospel tells the story of Jesus restoring the sight of a man blind from birth – and the people who don't recognize him are people who can see! As we prepare to reflect on this weekend's scripture, allow the readings to bring to light the "blind spots" in your life.

First Reading | 1 SM 16:1B, 6-7, 10-13A

The LORD said to Samuel: "Fill your horn with oil, and be on your way. I am sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem, for I have chosen my king from among his sons." As Jesse and his sons came to the sacrifice, Samuel looked at Eliab and thought, "Surely the LORD's anointed is here before him." But the LORD said to Samuel: "Do not judge from his appearance or from his lofty stature, because I have rejected him. Not as man sees does God see, because man sees the appearance but the LORD looks into the heart." In the same way Jesse presented seven sons before Samuel, but Samuel said to Jesse, "The LORD has not chosen any one of these." Then Samuel asked Jesse, "Are these all the sons you have?" Jesse replied, "There is still the youngest, who is tending the sheep." Samuel said to Jesse, "Send for him; we will not begin the sacrificial banquet until he arrives here." Jesse sent and had the young man brought to them. He was ruddy, a youth handsome to behold and making a splendid appearance. The LORD said, "There—anoint him, for this is the one!" Then Samuel, with the horn of oil in hand, anointed David in the presence of his brothers; and from that day on, the spirit of the LORD rushed upon David. The word the Lord. **Thanks be to God**

Responsorial Psalm | PS 23: 1-3A, 3B-4, 5, 6: The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want.

Second Reading | EPH 5:8-14

Brothers and sisters: You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light, for light produces every kind of goodness and righteousness and truth. Try to learn what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the fruitless works of darkness; rather expose them, for it is shameful even to mention the things done by them in secret; but everything exposed by the light becomes visible, for everything that becomes visible is light. Therefore, it says: "Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light."

Gospel | JN 9:1, 6-9, 13-17, 34-38

As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth. He spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva, and smeared the clay on his eyes, and said to him, "Go wash in the Pool of Siloam" — which means Sent —. So he went and washed, and came back able to see. His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said, "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?" Some said, "It is," but others said, "No, he just looks like him." He said, "I am." They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees. Now Jesus had made clay and opened his eyes on a sabbath. So then the Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see. He said to them, "He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see." So some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, because he does not keep the sabbath." But others said, "How can a sinful man do such signs?" And there was a division among them. So they said to the blind man again, "What do you have to say about him, since he opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet." They answered and said to him, "You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" Then they threw him out. When Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, he found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered and said, "Who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he." He said, "I do believe, Lord," and he worshiped him.

Reflection Questions

- 1. What words/phrases strike you? Why?
- 2. Jesus' act of mixing spit with dirt is a symbol for Jesus (spit = coming from the mouth of God/divine nature & dirt = human nature), Jesus is the salve (saliva/salvation) that allows us to see properly. How has Jesus changed that way you see things? How has Jesus changed the way you respond to the Coronavirus?
- 3. Where the "blind spots in your life?"

Creed
