29 de Septiembre – ¿Un santo de Rapid City? – Nicholas Alce Negro

La semana pasada escribí sobre mi viaje a Rapid City, Dakota del Sur, para la ordenación episcopal del padre Scott Bullock. Pero otra historia de la Diócesis de Rapid City es la de Nicholas Alce Negro, un nativo americano lakota sioux que se convirtió al catolicismo a los 40 años y se convirtió en un activo catequista y misionero para su pueblo. Rapid City ha abierto la "causa para su canonización", el proceso formal para declararlo oficialmente santo de la Iglesia Católica. (Si quieres aprender más sobre el proceso de cómo alguien se convierte en santo, ven a mi charla el martes 15 de octubre a las 6 p.m. en Rustic Brew, donde hablaré sobre "¡Todo sobre los santos!") De todos modos, quería contarles un poco sobre el Beato Nicholas Black Elk. Algunos de ustedes pueden haber oído hablar de Alce Negro a través de un libro titulado "Black Elk Speaks", de John Neihardt. Es un libro en el que Alce Negro habla sobre las tradiciones, costumbres y estilo de vida de los indios Lakota Sioux, y se volvió muy popular en las universidades de estudios nativos americanos y estudios religiosos. Pero, aunque ese libro fue tremendamente popular, algunas personas que conocieron a Alce Negro, incluidos algunos de sus hijos, lamentaron que el libro no contara otra parte muy importante de la vida de Black Elk: su fe católica. La esposa de Alce Negro, Katie, se convirtió al catolicismo, bautizaron a sus tres hijos y fueron criados en la fe católica. En 1903, Katie, por desgracia, falleció. En 1904, cuando tenía 40 años, Alce Negro decidió convertirse a la fe católica y adoptó el nombre de "Nicholas". Pero Nicholas Alce Negro no vio su conversión a la fe católica como una ruptura con la tradición lakota, sino como una profundización y cumplimiento de lo que va creía. Cuando Alce Negro era joven, tuvo experiencias de extrañas visiones místicas. Más tarde, consideró que estas visiones místicas lo preparaban para recibir el Evangelio y que eran visiones proféticas que se cumplían en el cristianismo.

Así, se vio a sí mismo como un buen lakota al convertirse al catolicismo. Vio el puente, la armonía entre ambos. Más tarde se dedicó a la vida de catequista. En aquel entonces, los catequistas no eran simplemente aquellos que daban clase una vez por semana, sino que servían más como diáconos o misioneros. Viajaba y visitaba distintos hogares, enseñándoles la fe católica. Visitaba a los enfermos y a los que no podían salir de sus casas y rezaba con ellos. Se decía que a menudo llevaba un rosario en una mano y su pipa en la otra.

Cuando pensamos en la historia del Oeste americano, a menudo pensamos en el enfrentamiento entre europeos y nativos americanos, entre vaqueros e indios. La historia de Nicholas Alce Negro es una de cómo Cristo "irrumpe" en esta historia para atraer "a todas las personas hacia Sí". Allanar el camino para que los Lakota lleguen a conocer a Cristo y Su Evangelio salvador, y allanar el camino para que diferentes pueblos en guerra puedan unirse en paz en Jesucristo.

Sept. 29, 2024 - A Saint of Rapid City? - Nicholas Black Elk

I wrote last week about going to Rapid City, South Dakota for the Bishop Ordination of Fr. Scott Bullock.

But another story of the Diocese of Rapid City is the story of Nicholas Black Elk, a Lakota Sioux Native American who converted to Catholicism in his 40s, and became an active catechist and missionary to his people. Rapid City has opened the "cause for his canonization," the formal process of formally declaring him a Saint of the Catholic Church. (If you want to learn more about the process of *how* one becomes a Saint, come to my talk on Tues. Oct. 15 at 6pm at the Rustic Brew, where I will talk "All About Saints!") Anyways, I wanted to tell you a little bit about Servant of God Nicholas Black Elk.

Some of you may have heard of Black Elk through a book titled, "Black Elk Speaks," by John Neihardt. It is a book where Black Elk speaks about the Lakota Sioux Indian traditions, customs, and way of life, and became very popular at Universities for Native American Studies and Religious Studies.

But while that book was wildly popular, some people who knew Black Elk, including some of his children, lamented that the book neglected to tell another very important part of Black Elk's life: his Catholic Faith.

Black Elk's wife, Katie, converted to Catholicism, and they had their three children baptized and raised in the Catholic faith. In 1903 Katie, unfortunately, died. In 1904, in his 40s, Black Elk decided to himself convert to the Catholic Faith, taking the name "Nicholas." But Nicholas Black Elk did not see his conversion to the Catholic faith as a break from Lakota tradition. He saw it as the deepening and fulfillment of what he already believed. When Black Elk was young, he had experiences of strange mystical visions. He later saw these Mystical Visions as preparing him to receive the Gospel, that they were prophetic visions that were fulfilled in Christianity. Thus he saw himself as being a good Lakota by becoming a Catholic. He saw the bridge, the harmony between them. He later dedicated himself to the life of a catechist. Back then, Catechists were not merely those who taught class once a week, but served more like deacons or missionaries. He would travel and visit different homes, teaching them about the Catholic faith. He would visit the sick and homebound and pray with them. He was said to often have a rosary in one hand and his smoking pipe in the other.

When we think about the story of the American West, we often think about the clash of Europeans and Native Americans, between Cowboys and Indians. The story of Nicholas Black Elk is one of how Christ is "breaking into" this story, to draw "all people to Himself." To pave the way for the Lakota to come to know Christ and His Saving Gospel, and to pave the way for different warring peoples to be able to come together in peace in Jesus Christ.


